PRT 5960-71: Special Topics: Leadership in Wilderness Ethics

Curriculum and Syllabus

NOLS with the University of Utah

Course Curriculum Description: The NOLS Expedition Core Curriculum is composed of four themes: leadership, wilderness skills, risk management, and environmental studies. Wildland ethics and management are central to the environmental studies theme. Preserving our classrooms for the future is essential. Understanding the complexity, diversity, and fragility of these wildlands guides how and where we teach, eat, sleep, travel and learn skills. Students gain a scientific and empirical understand of ecosystems and learn the guiding principles behind land managers' decisions and regulations, and they apply these same principles to our group's behavior during the expedition. They take from these courses the knowledge, skills, and ability to lead others in wild places in an ethical way.

A Leave No Trace Level 2 Instructor Course is typically a backcountry expedition of five days during which participants gain a comprehensive understanding of Leave No Trace skills and ethics through practical application in the field. These courses are designed for people who actively teach others outdoor skills or provide recreation information to the public, and emphasize three components, low-impact camping skills, wildland ethics, and outdoor teaching techniques. Each participant will present a short (15-20 minute) class on one of the Leave No Trace principles. Core components for a Level 2 Insructor course include:

- The seven Leave No Trace principles (plan ahead and prepare, travel and camp on durable surfaces, dispose of waste properly, leave what you find, minimize campfire impacts, respect wildlife, be considerate of other visitors)
- An historical perspective of environmental thought and Leave No Trace
- A wildland ethic based on ecology and applied to outdoor recreation
- The scientific basis for Leave No Trace
- Global perspectives: widening the circle of awareness to other environments and cultures
- United States federal land management (US Forest Service, National Park Service, Bureau of Land Management, National Fish and Wildlife Service, the National Wilderness Preservation System, the Wilderness Act of 1964)
- Citizen involvement: beyond the backcountry
- Leave No Trace action plans
- Teaching techniques

Student Outcomes

The following learning objectives detail what students learn during their Leave No Trace Level 2 Instructor Course. All curriculum emphasizes transfer of learning and prepares students to act as environmental leaders by assessing themselves, working towards sustainable changes in their own lives, and leading others toward a more sustainable future. By the end of the course each student will be able to:

- Understand and apply the Leave No Trace principles to camping and travel in varied environments.
- Role model and teach others responsible environmental behaviors.
- Articulate an environmental ethic.
- Understand public land management and the federal agencies charged with it in the United States.

This course is offered on a credit/no credit basis only. No letter grades are available.
